Mission: To identify, track, and monitor work-related fatalities, injuries, and illnesses in order to improve worker health and safety across Montana.

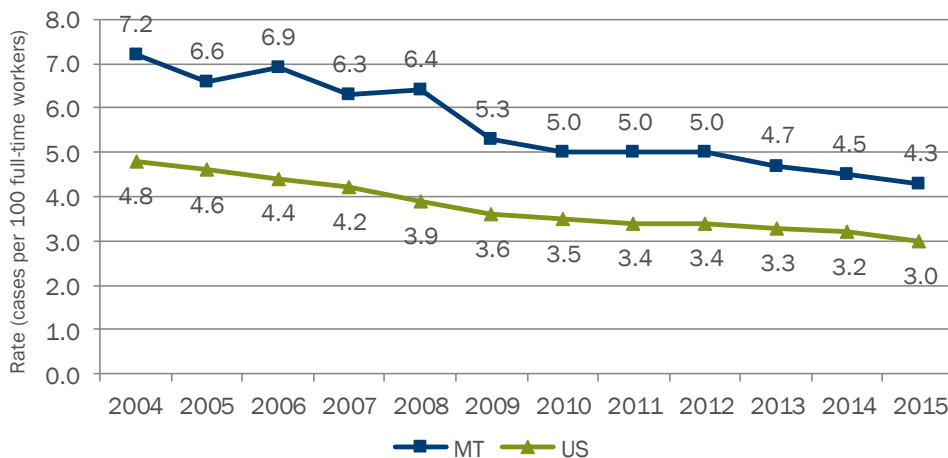
- Build a strong and dependable occupational health surveillance system for Montana

Why are we researching occupational health in Montana?

In 2015, the Montana Department of Labor & Industry received a grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to establish an occupational health surveillance program in Montana to guide prevention and intervention activities.

Montana has consistently high incidence rates of work-related injuries and illnesses. In 2008, Montana had the highest rate of work-related injuries and illnesses in the country (6.4 cases of injury or illness per 100 full-time workers). The most recent data shows that Montana had 4.3 cases per 100 full-time workers in 2015, making it the fourth highest rate of work-related injuries and illnesses in the country.
